It is January 19<sup>th</sup> and luckily, we have had only two minor snowstorms. During both storms we had the same issue with people not moving their vehicles and/or parking in their driveways. Many residents move their vehicles, but the vehicle on either side of them do not. There are elderly people and people with mobility concerns who need the clean area to enter and exit their vehicles.

We will be putting flyers on vehicles that have not moved five to six days after the snow fall, in addition to a \$50. fine. We will also be giving fines to everyone who parks their cars (illegally) in their driveways. I have had people say that it is not fair and ask, "What if someone is out of town or in the hospital?" Many people who leave for the winter or an extended period of time, often leave their car keys with a neighbor or relative so the vehicle can be moved. Obviously, if someone is in the hospital, we would not levy a fine. The Board wants to solve this problem and are willing to try a number of plans to accomplish this.

Due to a recent minor fire in one of our condominiums, I would like to remind everyone that according to our Bylaws, "Every co-owner shall obtain insurance coverage at their own expense upon their unit and upon the Limited Common Elements for which the co-owner has maintenance, repair or replacement responsibility per the provisions of the Condominium documents." If you are a renter, you should carry renter's insurance and your landlord must also carry insurance. If you need further information on this matter, please contact me at the clubhouse.

As we near the end of January, I always see spring as right around the corner. I know that I am fooling myself, but you do start noticing that it's staying light longer, and you start saying "Well we got through December and January and February is a short month, and then it's March, and finally April starts bringing better weather," so in my mind it's almost summer .

Let's all get through these cold couple of months, stay healthy and look forward to spring coming.

I often start my spring cleaning now so that when the warm weather comes, I can be outdoors taking walks or planning my spring garden. Remember that the clubhouse has a workout room that is free to use, pool tables and a ping pong table. We also have a nice library and an ongoing puzzle table. Also, until further notice, <u>masks must be worn in the clubhouse</u>. We hope to change this policy as soon as possible.

Finally, in going over the final year-end financials, we have noticed how much we were over our NHCA budget in the following areas. Water usage was over by \$90,000. We realize that the cost of water went up last year, but we also believe that some of it has to do with leaky toilets, faucets etc. If you have leaks in your plumbing, you must get them fixed. I am going to start reviewing the water bill and look at each buildings usage and might have to get into units if we see that there is unusually high usage. If you are a renter, contact the owner and if the problem does not get fixed, call the clubhouse and we will call them.

Our <u>heating fuel</u> was over budget by \$28,000 and the cost per CFU's this year has increased, so we are predicting an even higher bill. I was surprised in driving through the complex in seeing how many people leave their windows partially open – this is just money being poured out the window.

When you go to bed at night turn your thermostat down, buy a programmable thermostat and change your furnace filters. When you leave for work or on vacation, turn your heat down. Little improvements like any of these multiplied by 646 units helps keep your maintenance fee down.

If you have any questions just call the clubhouse, ask for Sean and he will help you.



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# FOR YOUR INFORMATION

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SLEDDING & CROSS-COUNTRY SKIING ON COMMONS: Now that we're into our winter months, with snow lurking around the corner, some might be sledding and cross-country skiing around Beechwood lake and along the Rouge River area. Please recognize with the freezing and thawing of the lake water, it is NOT safe to go onto its surface.

Although sledding in the back of the clubhhouse is not advised, some will sled anyway – the deep fluffy snow would be a big attraction. Please make sure you stay within the higher grassy areas, and <u>not sled or ski any where close to the lake or river water</u>. No one wants to experience an unfortunate accident.



- SCAMS: Alerts on numerous scams have been previously published in the View, but now there are more. Many have been fooled by those selling Covid test kits via email, online or over the phone. Do not respond to these, as the sources take your money, kits are not reliable and are not accurate! Please be aware of the danger of responding and inform your family and friends of them as well.
- POOCH WASTE PICKUP: Snow is still covering the grassy areas, but the donations from our four-legged friends should be picked up from the grounds. Perhaps some residents are still not aware that picking up after your pet is a part of Chapter 28 of Troy's ordinance as well as NHCA's rules & regulations, stating pets waste is to be picked up and disposed of properly. There are trash cans in the area for this purpose if you don't want to carry it home, plus even during the winter months staff regularly empties the cans. Thank you for following through on this on every walk throughout the year!
- ▶ **KEEP YOUR UNIT'S WINDOWS, DOORS AND GARAGE DOORS CLOSED**: With natural gas prices high, keep in mind there is **significant heat loss** through open garage doors, windows, patio and front doors. Remember heating costs are part of your maintenance fee. Help us to save money, thereby saving you money, by keeping them closed through the cold winter months.
- NESIDENT FEEDBACK: A resident had volunteered this month to give some "common sense" ideas on staying warm and saving energy, thereby keeping our fees stable.
  - Open window coverings when sun is shining into your home, close at night to keep cold out.
  - Adjust ceiling fans to bring up warmer air.
  - Install a storm door on front entrance.
  - Install a glass fireplace door to keep cold air out and stop drafts.
  - Check faucets for dripping water, repair if needed.

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Hi Folks,

Al Sloan here. You may remember me from the memorial I placed in the View for my wife Deb, who passed away in June of 2021. About that same time, you may have seen some pics online of an albino deer spotted along the woods in Court H. FYI: An albino deer is one which is white in color. I shared my story with the staff at the View, and they asked if I would share it with our community. So here it is.

For years Deb would enjoy watching the deer in the morning, from our dining room table while having our morning coffee.

When Deb passed away last summer, it was an exceedingly difficult time for me. After 36 years together, I was not sure how I would carry on. Then out of the clear blue, in the city of Troy, appeared an albino deer. Some data shows that only one in a hundred thousand deer is born albino. Not only did this albino deer appear in Troy, but at the Northfield Hills Condos. And in our back yard? I called it my Little Angel, as it was white as snow. And what are the odds it would appear at such a dark time in my life?

I shared this story with my friend Samuel in Kenya, whom I had met while on a medical mission in 2019. Samuel said they will occasionally see albino Rhinos and Giraffes in Kenya. There they have a belief that if you gaze upon an albino animal, a loved one is watching over you and you will have peace. That confirmed everything I was thinking.

Some will look upon this albino deer as an oddity. I look at it as my Salvation. And I will go to my grave believing that I was blessed with the presence of my Little Angel, who was helping to console me during those challenging times. Thanks Deb!

New Year's Eve is celebrated in China in much the same way as it is here in the United States. It is the last day of the last month of the traditional Chinese calendar. It is also called the spring festival since it comes at the end of winter. In 2022 the Lunar New Year celebration begins on Tuesday, February 1<sup>st</sup> and ends with the Lantern Festival on Tuesday, February 15<sup>th</sup>.

The Chinese attach one of their 12 zodiac icons to each year. This year is the "Year of the Tiger." The tiger is valued for its strength, bravery and exorcising evil.

This Lunar New Year has been celebrated for 5,000 years, with the Chinese calendar being based on the phases of the moon. The New Year can range traditionally from January 22<sup>nd</sup> to February 19<sup>th</sup>.

The end of the festival is called the **Lantern Festival** which traditionally comes 14 or 15 days after the start of the New Year.

The Chinese people celebrate the good fortunes of the last year and hope for health and prosperity in the coming year. The eve of the New Year is just the start of the celebration. Although the traditional holiday festival can last up to two weeks, most modern day Chinese citizens only recognize the first few days, depending whether or not it falls on a weekend. In the U.S. many states hold festivities during the Chinese New Year.

Families frequently travel to meet with other family members, especially the elders of the family. Festival meals consist of Chinese dumplings and fish. Leading up to midnight on New Year's Eve, Dragon Dances, parades, and various local activities are common. Fireworks after sunset are widespread and plentiful nationwide.

In modern day China a variety TV show is shared with family members and includes dancing, singing, magic, comedy skits and interviews with celebrities and movie stars. This tradition is similar to the American Dick Clark and Guy Lombardo shows of the past.





Every year since the 1800s, Groundhog Day has been observed the second day of February in both the U.S. and in Canada. This year, Groundhog Day falls on Wednesday, February 2<sup>nd</sup>. Hard to believe, but in some states this day is observed as a public holiday.

Groundhog Day came about because of a German superstition. They thought if a hibernating animal cast a shadow on February 2<sup>nd</sup>, that winter weather would last for another six weeks. If there was no shadow, spring would come early.

The German tradition holds that if the sun comes out on <u>Candlemas</u>, the hedgehog will see its shadow and six more weeks of winter will follow. It may have begun as a bit of "folk humor." When German settlers came to Pennsylvania they continued this practice, using <u>groundhogs instead of hedgehogs</u> to predict the weather.

Historically, this day is observed through the behavior of a particular "weather forecasting" groundhog named *Punxsutawney Phil*, who lives in his burrow on Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania for a short period preceding February 2<sup>nd</sup>. (Myth states at other times he lives downtown with another groundhog named Phyllis.)



On the 2nd of February, Phil comes out from his burrow and looks for his shadow. If he sees his shadow and goes back into the burrow, then the United States will have an extended winter of six more weeks. But if he does not see his shadow, and remains outside, it means winter will soon end and spring will arrive very shortly.

Perhaps you're wondering how Phil has lived long enough to still be carrying out this tradition. Legend has it that he has been given a secret potion over the years which has the power to extend the life of a groundhog by six years every time he drinks it!

Remember to watch the local weather stories to find out if either Phil or our very own Woody (who lives in Howell,) has seen his shadow.

Let's keep our fingers crossed that spring is coming soon!

The month of February is the shortest month of the year, unless it is a leap year which occurs every four years.

Depending on the source, its name comes from either the Italian god Februus or from februa, which signifies the festivals of purification celebrated in Rome during this time.

Believe it or not, up until 713BC the Romans had no name for January or February on the grounds the winter months didn't deserve them. Plus, had you known February is the most misspelled and mispronounced of all months?

- The birthstone is the Amethyst which symbolizes spirituality, wisdom and security
- The flower is the Violet or Primrose

February is Black History Month and American Heart Association Month. This year the Chinese New Year is celebrated on February 1<sup>st</sup>. Let's not forget for those football fans, Super Bowl LVI will be held on February 13<sup>th</sup> in Los Angeles.

with people waiting to hear if there will be an early spring or a long winter! Since it is Dental Health Month - for us, as well as


our furry friends, it is natural for February to be the American Tooth Fairy Smile Drive Month!

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# VALENTINE'S DAY



**Saint Valentine's Day**, commonly shortened to **Valentine's Day**, is traditionally a day celebrating love and affection, which is expressed to someone by giving flowers or candy, or sending greeting cards - known as "valentines".

Historically, the day was named after one or more early Christian martyrs named Valentine. In 1969, Pope Paul VI deleted it from the Roman calendar of saints, but its religious observance is still allowed and followed.


The two most common Valentine's Day symbols are the **heart** - particularly in reds and pinks, and pictures or models of Cupid.

**Cupid** is usually portrayed as a small winged figure with a bow and arrow. In mythology, he uses his arrow to strike the hearts of people. People who have fallen in love are sometimes said to be "struck by Cupid's arrow."

Valentine greetings were popular as far back as the Middle Ages, although it wasn't until after the 1400s when written notes began to appear.

Americans probably began exchanging <u>handmade valentines</u> in the early 1700s. The first commercially produced Valentine's Day greeting cards were created in the 1840s by Esther A. Howland. Known as the "Mother of the Valentine," she made elaborate creations with lace, ribbons and colorful pictures.

Although sending "paper" Valentine's Day cards has been offset by email or text, this day is second only to Christmas in card purchases!



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# BLACK HISTORY MONTH

In both the United States and in Canada, since



1976 the month of February has been designated as Black History Month. It is a month to pay tribute to those people and events in the history of the

African Diaspora - the movement of Black Africans and their descendants to places around the world.

It had been suggested in 1970 by black educators and Kent State students, but six years later during America's bicentennial, President Gerald Ford recognized February as Black History month. He urged Americans to seize the opportunity to honor the accomplishments of Black Americans in the nation's history.

Celebrations being held will include accounts of people, places and happenings; such as, the beginning of jazz, the civil rights movement, and other meaningful historic events.

The commemorations will run through the month of February.

Some will be virtual, others will be guided tours with reservations needed. Please check website venues for information, including the Henry Ford Museum at www.thehenryford.org.

# American Heart Month\*

\*Repeated each February as it is important information for our NH residents.



Through efforts of the American Heart Association, in 1963 Congress required the president every year to proclaim February as

American Heart Month.

Cardiovascular diseases, including strokes and heart attacks, are still considered our nation's leading cause of death.

Family history, eating habits, and sleeping patterns all come into the picture for susceptibility for a heart attack or stroke.



Sometimes symptoms of a heart attack or stroke are difficult to identify, as they may be different in women from men. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster.

Here are a few signs to check for:

- -Shortness of breath when you are used to doing an activity.
- -Irregular pain in the lower or upper back.
- -Jaw pain when doing an activity, with no dental issues.
- Lightheadedness
- -Nausea or vomiting

If you are experiencing any of the above symptoms, go to your doctor immediately or to the emergency room.

# Stroke Warning Signs

A stroke is a medical emergency. Every second counts, because time lost is brain lost.

Know these <u>warning signs</u> and share them:

- Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body.
- Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding.
- Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes.
- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination.
- Sudden severed headache with no known cause.

Also, when these occur, check the time so you'll know when the first symptoms appeared. If given with three hours of the start of symptoms, a clot bursting drug can reduce long-term disability for the most common type of stroke.

**Don't delay on calling 9-1-1** or an EMS number immediately so an ambulance (ideally one with life support) can arrive.

# Rewards of Rescuing a Pet

Love comes in all sizes, ages and breeds in America's animal shelters and rescue organizations, where the next four-footed member of your family may be found.

You Take Home a Sure Thing. Since they spend time caring for them, most shelter and rescue workers become familiar with the animals. The time in custody allows staff to assess their behavior and know whether they have been house-trained. That screening enables them to help you pick a dog or cat that will be the right fit for your family and lifestyle.

Your New Pet Arrives in Good Health. Before a shelter dog is put up for adoption, he gets a full physical examination that normally includes vaccinations, a

heartworm test, and microchipping. If he has not yet been neutered or she has not been spayed, the shelter vet takes care of that before the animal meets the public. Although there is a charge for adoption, it is usually far below what an owner would pay for medical services on the outside.

You Save Two Animals' Lives. Crowded shelters force staff members to make difficult decisions about euthanizing pets no one wants. When you adopt, not only do you save the life of your new pet, you free up space in the facility to give another one a chance at finding a new home.

# Benefits of Adopting an Older Pet

People who give an older pet a second chance are rewarded for their choice in many ways.

Your Pet is Already Trained. When you choose an older cat who already uses a litter box, or an older dog who has been housetrained and knows the basic commands, you don't have to take time to teach them.

Your Pet is Calm. Kittens and puppies, cute as they are, are a handful to manage. A calm older cat isn't likely to climb up your curtains (or claw up your leg). A fully grown dog doesn't require as many bathroom breaks as a pup, and he's less likely to chew furniture, wires, shoes, clothing or anything else that reminds him of you.

Your Pet is Grateful. Animals are sensitive, and they know when they've reached a safe and loving place. Adopt an older cat or dog, and they will repay you with love and loyalty that lasts a lifetime.

# **FANCY CASHEW BRITTLE**

- from Lois's Kitchen

Makes about 16 pieces, 2 by 3 inches

## Ingredients:

1 can (9.5 oz. or 2 cups) roasted, salted, cashew halves with pieces

1 cup granulated sugar

½ cup light corn syrup

1 tsp. butter

1 tsp. vanilla

1. Tsp. baking soda



#### Procedure:

- In a 2-quart microwave safe bowl (glass measuring cup,) stir together the nuts, sugar and corn syrup.
- \*Microwave on high, stirring halfway through, for about 6-8 minutes or until mixture is light brown.
- While waiting, grease a cookie sheet with some butter and set aside.
- Using mitts, remove the nut mixture from the microwave. Stir in the butter and vanilla.
- Return to microwave, on high for another 1 to 2 minutes.
- Remove mixture and add baking soda, stirring quickly until the mix is light and foamy as it is thoroughly mixed in.
- Immediately pour it onto the baking sheet, using back of a spoon to spread it out as quickly as possible.
- Let the brittle stand until completely cooled, about 30 minutes.
- Break it into pieces and serve or store in airtight container for up to 2 weeks.
- \*Since microwave wattages differ, please watch mixture carefully.



# WINTER PARKING INFORMATION

Due to the importance of the information listed below, we felt it necessary to repeat this message and insist the following parking rules be observed. The Northfield Hills Condominium Association has 646 units and it takes much time, and big money to keep our parking areas, sidewalks and streets free of snow. Your cooperation and extra effort during the winter months is essential and very much appreciated.

# **PARKING**

With parking at such a premium, we must remind everyone that if you have a garage you MUST park your vehicle in it. Curbside parking is also illegal as they are Fire Lanes.

If you have company, please remind them they cannot park in someone's reserved parking spot. Let everyone know that if there is a number on the parking spot then it belongs to someone and that they CANNOT park there. Thank you.

# WINTER PARKING

Vehicles must be moved out of the court parking spaces when the plows arrive in each area. The snowplow drivers will perform an initial clean-up and then return a second time to allow Co-owners extra time if necessary.

Exercise caution when plow trucks are present – the drivers' vision is limited.

Salt your porch and sidewalk before a light snow. Spreading salt will help prevent ice buildup and slippery conditions. Salt is effective only for temperatures above 20 degrees.

Co-owners should not leave dog leashes, children's toys, and newspapers on sidewalks and porches. These items can become buried beneath the snow and cause injury to workers or damage to the blowers.

Vehicles should not be parked in or around the traffic circles at the end of Breeze Hill Place and Buckingham Place as this may prevent the snowplows from turning efficiently and prevent moving snow from the street. Also, large emergency vehicles use these traffic circles and parked vehicles impede their movement, slowing their response time.

Co-owners must remove cars parked in the driveway of their condo. Snowplow drivers are instructed not to plow adjoining driveways if a vehicle is parked in one of them. This pertains to all driveways, however long or short.

The City of Troy prohibits sidewalks from being obstructed. Cars parked in short driveways, where they cross the sidewalk, prevents the staff from effectively clearing your sidewalks. If the snow blower cannot be driven straight down the sidewalk to your condo's walkway, your sidewalks will not be shoveled.

Snowplows will **not** return to plow parking spaces after the day we sweep through the courts.

Do not leave decorative items on your front porch which may be damaged and will slow the shoveling process.

# Northfield Hills Snow Removal Rules - Including Fine Schedule

Vehicles <u>MUST</u> be moved out of the court parking spaces when the plows arrive in each area. The snowplow drivers will perform an initial clean-up and then return a second time to allow co-owners extra time if necessary. Vehicles that have not moved after the second sweep will result in a <u>fine being levied</u>. Fine are fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the first fine, seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for the second fine and five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the third and each subsequent fine. Buckingham, Breeze Hill and Brentwood are always plowed first so you can park your car there and move it back after the plows have left. FOR ANYONE WHO HAS QUESTIONS ON PARKING YOU CAN CALL THE CLUBHOUSE AND ASK FOR SEAN, 248-641-9070.

Exercise caution when plow trucks are present – the drivers' vision is limited.
