If you are dissatisfied with writing monthly checks for your maintenance fee, please consider going on ACH or (Auto pay). You can pick up a form at the Clubhouse, fill it out, and it could go into effect as quickly as the following month. We have been doing ACH here at Northfield Hills for years and it is a very safe, effective and an easy way to pay your monthly maintenance fee.

If you haven't had your furnace checked lately, you might want to call a HVAC company to make sure it is operating efficiently and safely (there are a few who advertise in *The View from the Hills*). Also, it is very important for you to change the air filter on your furnace often depending on the type of furnace you have. You can go on-line and look up any website regarding HVAC to find out how to change your air filter. I have once again printed some articles and left them in the clubhouse if you would like more information. If you are a renter and you or your landlord haven't done this recently, please call them and ask them to.

It's hard to believe that it is this time of year already but on behalf of all of us here: We would like to wish you a very happy Thanksgiving! Thanksgiving to me is always such a great time to be with family and friends and eat to your heart's content.



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## FOR YOUR INFORMATION (F Y I)

- ➤ **SCAMS:** Ongoing and increasing...DO NOT ANSWER ANY CALLER QUESTIONS! If you can, call those companies to report the scamming or call the Inspector General's Fraud Hotline at 1-800-269-0271. <u>Alert to Families</u>: If you have someone who is living alone, remind them <u>not to respond</u> to unsolicited phone calls.
- ➤ **CRITTER TRAPS:** If you are someone who has recently needed and received a trap for animals around your unit, please <u>DO NOT set them on a Friday leading through the weekend</u>. There is no one here on the weekend to come to pick up the trapped critter; therefore, it will not be done until Monday.



- COLD WEATHER ITEMS: NHCA will have a "Lost & Found" box at the Clubhouse where anyone who has lost or found hats or gloves or any other item may turn them in to staff. Smaller found items are kept at the front desk.
- ➤ **DO NOT FLUSH ANY WIPES:** "Heads up" on NOT disposing of any wipes at all in your toilet. Units in our complex have had many plugged plumbing issues, needing professional work to be done! During these times, it is not only baby wipes, but hand cleaning and surface cleaning wipes as well. Despite what a label might say, they DO clog drains. Please dispose of in your trash.

## > WINTERIZING YOUR WATER PIPES:

\*TO PREVENT FREEZING OF WATER PIPES, EACH RESIDENT IS TO TAKE THESE STEPS:

- 1. In the basement of each unit there are two shut off valves for the outside water spigots. Turn both inside valves off completely.
- 2. Turn on the outside spigots in the front and back of your unit. <u>LEAVE THEM ON.</u> The water will eventually stop running. <u>DO NOT SHUT THEM OFF.</u>
- 3. Return to your basement and unscrew the drain plug (do not remove) to your shut-off valve, drain plug is located just beneath or on the side of each valve.

  Suggestion you may want to put a small pan under both drain plugs as a small amount will drip until pipes are emptied.

\*For our <u>SENIOR CITIZENS ONLY</u> who may be unable to winterize water pipes, please feel free to call the clubhouse (248-641-9070) to arrange to have this service performed by your Northfield Hills Maintenance Staff.



Repeating previous reminders, as there might be new residents who were not made aware of the following important items.

➤ PARKING - Garages & Driveways: If you have a garage with your unit, the Bylaws state your garage is your parking spot. Parking has become a premium and the courts are always filled, even without visitor's parking. It is also against our bylaws to park in your driveway if your car covers any part of the sidewalk or street. It is also against the law in the City of Troy.

**Numbered parking places**: Your place to park is in your marked spot, please. The unmarked places are for guest or workers visiting your court's homes. Show respect for others, please!

- PARKING & SNOW: When we do get snow, both your and your neighbor's driveway, approach and porch will not be shoveled or plowed if a vehicle is in the driveway. Please remind your guests of this rule too.
- CLOSE Windows, Doors and Garage Doors: It is imperative that residents keep garage doors, windows, patio and front doors closed during the colder months to avoid heat loss. Help NHCA save you some money, as remember that heating costs are not "free," but a big part of your maintenance fee!

## **National** Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month

November is also National Family Caregivers' Month, both signed into effect through a proclamation by President Ronald Reagan in 1983 and continued by every U.S. President since that time.

Alzheimer's Disease is the most common form of dementia. According to the latest Alzheimer's Association's Facts and Figures report, there are over five million Americans of all ages living with Alzheimer's disease. It is now the sixth leading cause of death in the U.S., as Alzheimer's kills more than breast cancer and prostate cancer combined.

Although some memory and critical thinking skills are lost as people age, here are some warning signs for early detection issued by the Alzheimer's Foundation of America:

- -Recent memory loss that disrupts daily life.
- -Confusion of time and place.
- -Difficulty in performing familiar tasks.
- -Challenges in planning or solving problems.
- -Trouble understanding spatial relationships.
- -Issues with perceiving visual images.
- -Problems with words in speaking or writing.
- -Decreased or poor judgment.

During November the American Diabetes Association (ADA) raises awareness of diabetes by educating the public to its symptoms and risk factors, as well as giving ideas on how to promote a healthier lifestyle to avoid becoming a diabetic. The theme this year through 2023 is: "Accessing Diabetes Care."

In 1921 Canadian doctors Banting and Macleod first discovered the use of insulin to save a diabetic child. Although testing, as well as treatment, have both come a long way since then, there are much more studies to be done. World Diabetes Day is always on November 14<sup>th</sup>, as it is Banting's birthday.

Statistics from medical organizations have reported that one in five people have diabetes and do not know it.

This disease is a serious one, which if left untreated, can lead to many complications; such as, kidney disease, heart disease, stroke, blindness, and

amputation.

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## NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

On August 3, 1990 President George H. W. Bush approved a joint resolution designating <u>November</u> as "National American Indian Heritage Month." Similar proclamations under variations on the name, including "Native American Heritage Month" and "National American Indian and Alaska Native Heritage Month", have been issued each year since 1994.

This month is set aside to celebrate their rich and diverse cultures, traditions and histories, while acknowledging the important contributions of Native people. Heritage Month is also the perfect time to educate the general public about the variety of tribes, their history, and the ways in which tribal citizens have worked to conquer the challenges they met along the journey.

There was good news in early 2020 for our American Indians regarding the gathering of sochan - which resembles a green-headed cone flower. The Federal Government relaxed regulations regarding its removal.

In the past, the spinach-like sochan, known for its vitamin and mineral benefits, only could be foraged along back roads or found in backyards. For the first

time in 85 years, due to an agreement between the Cherokee Nation and the Great Smoky National Park Service, registered participants are free to pick the plants and take home for use by their families.

This legal holiday commemorates the anniversary of the signing of the Armistice ending World War I. The main hostilities of WWI were finished at the 11<sup>th</sup> hour of the 11<sup>th</sup> day of the 11<sup>th</sup> month of 1918 with the signing of the armistice with Germany.

U.S. President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed an <u>Armistice Day</u> in 1919 to honor those who died for our freedom; then in 1938 an Act passed by Congress made the eleventh of November in every year a holiday to be dedicated to the cause for world peace.

In 1954 Congress modified this act to include <u>all veterans</u>, and President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed it into law.

## THANKSGIVING DAY

This traditionally American holiday is a family festival celebrated in America, while Canada and other countries have similar festivals. This year Thanksgiving falls in the U.S. on <u>Thursday, November 25<sup>th</sup></u>. Hopefully, Thanksgiving this year will be back to its usual celebratory time for families getting together and more church services being held.

The holiday commemorates the feast held in autumn of 1621 by the Pilgrim colonists and members of the Wampanoag people at Plymouth, Massachusetts. The gathering was a shared giving of thanks for the rain saving their corn crop to allow for a bountiful harvest. According to historical records, the first Thanksgiving feast was eaten outdoors due to lack of space and continued for three days.

In October 1777 all of the thirteen colonies joined in a communal celebration, which also marked the victory over the British. In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday in November as our Thanksgiving celebration.

Although some reports show that turkey is the main center of the Thanksgiving meal, the 1621 Plymouth colony accounts list a large variety of different foods. In addition to turkey, the meals consisted of lobster, duck, geese, venison, fish, corn, stewed pumpkin, beans and Indian corn meal with dried whortleberries (similar to blueberries). Since there was a short supply of flour during that period, neither pies nor bread would have been served during any meal as there had been a short supply of flour during that time,



On this day people express gratitude to God for His blessings, and give thanks to family, friends and neighbors for their love and support. Sharing a meal with others is an integral part of Thanksgiving Day celebrations.

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## No Bother Apple Cake

This is a great way to use apples during apple season. While you've got the apples, why not make a few of these and give them away as house gifts? Everyone

will think you went to a lot of trouble (but you'll know it was no bother at all). Heck!! Did I say in apple season? Nowadays, it's always apple season.

#### Ingredients:

- 2/3 cup vegetable oil
- 2 eggs
- 3 cups diced (peeled) apple
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans

#### **Directions:**

- 1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Grease a 9 x 13-inch baking pan.
- 2. In a large bowl, beat the oil and eggs until foamy. Stir in the apples and sugar.
- 3. In another large bowl, mix together the flour, baking soda, salt, and cinnamon; stir the apple mixture into flour mixture, then stir in the vanilla and nuts. Pour into prepared baking pan. Bake for 45 to 50 minutes or until top springs back when touched lightly.

2 cups frozen corn cilantro leaves

## **DIRECTIONS:**

- 1. Sauté the onion, scallion, and jalapeno until the onion is soft in a large saucepan. Add the broth, sweet potatoes, turkey, salt, and pepper. Cover and simmer for 30 minutes or until the potatoes are tender.
- 2. Add the corn and cook until the corn is heated through. Garnish with the cilantro leaves before serving.

varieties of mushrooms not commonly found in




such abundance. From an aesthetic point of view, they are truly pretty ones. BUT are they poisonous or not?

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## Fall Flocks

Now through early winter, birds of all sorts gather into their fall and winter flocks.

"Black birds," the collective name for various species including grackles, red-winged blackbirds, starlings, and others, are the first to flock together.

Mourning doves are among the next species to build larger and larger flocks.

Canada geese soon collect in groups larger than the family subflocks in which they've spent the summer. The impending migration to warmer, more food-rich environments - as signaled by decreasing amounts of daylight and slowly declining food supplies - is the big motivator.

During migration the birds will need to constantly find new food, roosting sites, and safe zones and stay on course, tasks made easier when the senses of many birds are tuned into it and when some of the group may have experience along the route from previous years.

To many species of birds, notably many duck species, the presence of others of their kind increases the appeal of a site. This phenomenon is called *local enhancement*.

For large, formation-flying birds such as geese, migrating in flocks also has added aerodynamic benefits. When they fly in a V formation, the whole flock increases the distance it can cover. As each bird flaps its wings, it creates a vortex in the air that provides an uplift for the bird following it. Lead birds regularly tire and fall back into the flock, with another of the group taking their place for a period.

Flocking also provides defense against predators that could make short work of any of the birds on their own. In a flock of birds, many sets of eyes are always scanning the environment in many different directions for the first hint of any danger. When one bird spots an approaching predator and takes flight, others can take their clue to do the same.

And when a flock of similarly colored birds takes flight, a predator has difficulty focusing on just one target and may become confused. It may even hesitate in entering the rolling, changing, swirling mass of birds.

Some bird species also gather in flocks for social and reproductive reasons.



## TIPS FOR CLEANING, HOME, AND HEALTH


Salt certainly makes our food more flavorful, but it can also work to fix many of our unexpected challenges around the house. Here are some of our favorite **household uses of salt.** 

## BEST USES OF SALT IN THE HOME

- Rub salt on fruit-stained clothes while still wet, then put them in the wash.
- For mildew spots, rub in salt and some buttermilk, and then let dry in the sun.
- If you spill wine or fruit juice on your tablecloth, pour salt on the spot immediately to absorb the stain.
- Apply a paste of salt and olive oil to ugly heat rings on your table. Let sit for about an hour and then wipe off with a soft cloth.
- To improve your iron, sprinkle salt on a piece of paper and run the sticky iron over it a few times while the iron is hot.
- To restore some of the color to faded fabric, soak it in a strong solution of salt and water.
- Mix a tablespoon of salt into the water of a vase of cut flowers to keep them fresh longer.
- A mixture of salt and vinegar will clean brass.
- Salt on the fingers when cleaning meat or fish will prevent your hands from slipping.
- To kill unwanted weeds growing in your driveway or between bricks and

- stones, pour boiling salt water over them.
- For perspiration stains, add enough water to salt to make a paste, then rub into the cloth. Wait for an hour, and then launder as usual.
- Cover spilled raw eggs with salt, then wipe clean with a paper towel.
- To freshen smelly sneakers (or any canvas shoe) sprinkle their insides with salt. Wait 24 hours for the salt to absorb the odor, and then shake them out.
- Pour salt directly onto a grease spill and come back to it later.
- A new broom will last longer if you soak the bristles in hot salt water before using it for the first time.
- Stainless steel can be cleaned by rubbing it with a gritty paste of two tablespoons of salt mixed with lemon juice. Rinse well and pat dry with a soft cloth.
- Rub two to three tablespoons of salt onto the stains inside your glass vases, and then scrub clean with a damp bristle brush.
- Gargle with warm salt water (¼ teaspoon salt to one cup water) to relieve a sore throat.
- Sprinkle salt on carpets to dry out muddy footprints before vacuuming.
- When silk flowers get dusty, put them in a paper bag with several tablespoons of salt and shake gently for two minutes to clean them.
- Refresh household sponges by soaking them in cold salt water for ten minutes.


