

# FOR YOUR INFORMATION

Season, some residents may be planning trips away from their homes to visit family or friends. Several times during the year there have been circumstances (natural gas issues, water problems, etc.) when Northfield Hills units needed to be accessed unexpectedly due to an urgent situation.

We are <u>reminding you again</u> how important it is for residents <u>to leave a key</u> to their unit at the Northfield Hills Clubhouse, which will only be used in case of an emergency. As previously written in *the View*, there is a secured lock-box for this purpose with only designated NH staff having access to it. Just as imperative is to <u>make sure your emergency contact</u> information has been updated. Your neighbors will thank you!

- WALKING AT NIGHT: When walking after sunset, please <u>carry a flashlight</u> and if possible, wear light colored clothing. Motorists will see you better when you are crossing the street or walking through the courts. Some outerwear, as well as canine collars, leashes and coats, are offered with reflective parts on them, making wearer more clearly visible to others.
  - be kept. Anyone who has lost or found hats or gloves or any other item, may turn them in to staff. Smaller found items are kept at the front desk.
  - **O WINTERIZING YOUR WATER PIPES:**

TO PREVENT FREEZING OF WATER PIPES, EACH RESIDENT IS TO TAKE THESE STEPS:

- 1. In the basement of each unit there are two shut off valves for the outside water spigots. Turn both inside valves off completely.
- 2. Turn on the outside spigots in the front and back of your unit. <u>LEAVE THEM ON.</u> The water will eventually stop running. <u>DO NOT SHUT THEM OFF.</u>
- 3. Return to your basement and unscrew the drain plug (do not remove) to your shut-off valve, drain plug is located just beneath or on the side of each valve.

  Suggestion you may want to put a small pan under both drain plugs as a small amount will drip until pipes are emptied.

\*\*\*For our <u>SENIOR CITIZENS ONLY</u> who may be unable to winterize water pipes, please feel free to call the clubhouse (248-641-9070) to arrange to have this service performed by your Northfield Hills Maintenance Staff.

SNOW REMOVAL: It is extremely important to review the NHCA Rules & Regulations in regard to winter time parking, in this December/January View issue.

# FOR SAFETY'S SAKE

With holiday shopping and winter moving in, it is time again to remind people about important recommendations from the Troy Police Department officers at a safety seminar. In addition to driving safely along roads, we think these tips are ones to be practiced all through the year!

# Safety in Vehicles

- Keep your vehicle in good working condition - your gas tank more than half-full.
- Carry a phone!
- Lock your car when parking even if just for a minute parking in your driveway.
- When parking at night, select a place that will be well lighted when you return. Be watchful in parking lots and garages. Check for loiterers before you open your car door.
- When you return to your car, <u>have</u>
   your key ready before you get to the
   car. Look in the front and rear seats
   before you unlock the car. Walk
   away if something seems "off."
- Keep your car keys in your purse or pocket <u>Never leave your car keys in</u> your outerwear when checking your coat.

 If necessary, use your car horn button on your vehicle key control. This gives out a loud noise, and is a <u>first-line crime</u> stopper!

# On the Road

- Never pick up hitchhikers. Forbid your children to hitchhike!
- When stopped in traffic, leave enough room in front of your car so that you can pull out and around the car in front if you are approached. Blow your horn!
- If you have a flat tire, drive on it until you reach a place of safety.
- If your car does break down, lock the doors, roll up the windows and <u>stay</u> in the car. Turn on the emergency



flashers and hang a white cloth out the

driver's window. If someone stops to help, ask them to send the police, but do not open the door or window.

 If you think you are being followed, do not drive home. Go to the police station, an open gas station, or restaurant. If necessary, blow the horn until someone comes to assist you. Do not leave the car <u>unless you are certain</u> that you can get inside the building.

# December Fun, Facts & Trivia

The month of December comes from the Latin word decem meaning ten. Although it was originally the tenth month of the year, on the Roman calendar, when January and February were added, December became the twelfth month on the Gregorian calendar.

- -Turquoise, blue topaz, tanzanite, zircon, lapis, onyx, and the ruby are the birthstones.
- The Paper White Narcissus is the birth flower symbolizing self esteem.
   Holly and the Poinsettia are also flowers for this month.

The Winter Solstice (or first day of winter,) is on December 21<sup>st</sup> this year in the northern hemisphere. This is the date when the sun's daily maximum position in the sky is the lowest, which results in the shortest day and longest night of the year.

In addition to our religious celebrations, this month brings us World Aids Day on the 1<sup>st</sup>, Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day on the 7<sup>th</sup>, and Human Rights Day on the 10<sup>th</sup>.

In the U.S. December 15<sup>th</sup> is our Bill of Rights Day, as three-quarters of the state legislators ratified the first ten amendments to our Constitution in 1791.

This year is the 55<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the launch of **Apollo 8** - the first voyage to take humans to the moon and back, which is celebrated on the 21<sup>st</sup>. Our U.S. astronauts Borman, Lovell and Anders orbited the moon and were the first to see the side of the moon facing away from earth.

December also has its: 'Wear Brown Shoes Day', Cocoa Day, Day of the Ninja, 'Don't be a Scrooge Day' and even a Monkey Day!

# A CELEBRATION OF JOY

This year, Hanukkah or Chanukah begins at sundown on December 7<sup>th</sup> and ends at sundown on December 15<sup>th</sup>. Known as the Jewish festival of rededication, it is also recognized as the *Festival of Lights* which runs for eight days. The religious observance related to this holiday is the lighting of candles, arranged in a chanukkiah, holding nine candles; one lighted for each night, plus a shamus at a different height. Blessings are given when each candle is lighted, and they are allowed to burn out on their own.

Historically, at the time of <u>rededication</u>, there was no oil left to light the candelabrum in the Temple, and to burn throughout the night every night of the rededication. There was only enough oil to burn for one day.



By some miracle, it burned for <u>eight</u> <u>days</u> – the time needed to prepare a fresh supply of oil. Chanukah

commemorates the "miracle of the oil."

Traditionally fried foods are served during Chanukah due to the significance of oil to the holiday. This would include "latkes," or potato pancakes as some of us know them.

Gift giving is not a traditional part of the holiday, but has been added in families where Jews have a lot of contact with Christians. It is unusual to give gifts to anyone other than the young children. A traditional gift would be "gelt" (small amounts of money).

During this Jewish holiday "dreidel" is often played – a game using a squared top game piece. A dreidel is marked with four Hebrew letters. If you had played this game in Jerusalem, the letters on the dreidel spelled out, "A great miracle happened here" referring to the great miracle of the oil.

# **CHRISTMAS**

**Christmas Day** is always observed on December 25<sup>th</sup> to commemorate the birth of Jesus – the heart of Christianity.

The word Christmas originated from "Christ's Mass," and is central to the time of year as it also marks the beginning of the season of <u>Christmastide</u>, which lasts twelve days.



Christians around the world celebrate Christmas in various ways. Each country has its own religious traditions which

are unique to its culture.

In the U.S. many Christians will share the celebration of Christ's birth by setting up a <u>nativity scene</u>, singing hymns, decorating homes and churches with

garland, trees, and symbols of the Christ child.

Individual family traditions for displaying Christmas lights and small family gatherings with gift giving, will be locally and universally practiced.

In addition to the popular Santa Claus, other countries have Father Christmas and St. Nicholas associated with gift giving.

Merging the divine nature of Christmas with regional cultures of each country has led to this season being celebrated by many people all over the world.





# **POINSETTIA\***



... the traditional plant to give during this beautiful time of

year! The plant also has its day on December 12th...it's Poinsettia Day!

The poinsettia is named in honor of <u>Joel</u>
Robert Poinsett, our first US Ambassador to
Mexico, who first introduced this beautiful
Central American plant into the US. Dates for
its introduction vary, although the year of
1828 is most often reported.

History notes that the Aztecs called this plant "Cuetlaxochiti," and during the 14th to 16th century the sap was used to control fevers and the bracts were used to make red dye.

Poinsett had an interest in botany, and during his stay in Mexico, he wandered the countryside looking for new plant species. He found this beautiful shrub with large red flowers growing next to a road; took cuttings from the plant and brought them back to his greenhouse in South Carolina.

In the early 1900s the Ecke family in southern California first grew poinsettias outdoors for use as landscape plants as well as cut flowers, and then the family grew them in greenhouses. The Ecke's are now recognized as the leading producer of poinsettias in the US.

If you receive a poinsettia this season, here are some 'care tips' provided by the University of Illinois Extension Division:

- Unwrap plant carefully and place in indirect light. Six hours of light daily is perfect but keep the plant from touching cold windows.
- ldeally poinsettias require daytime temperatures of 60° to 70° F. with night time temperatures about 55° F. High temperatures can shorten the plant's life. Move plant to a cooler room at night if possible.
- Check soil daily. Water when soil is dry. Punch holes in foil so water can drain into a saucer, then discard excess water.

\*An <u>important reminder</u> to those who have canines or felines in your household: Keep your poinsettias away from pets and keep pets away from your plants. The milky-white substance could be toxic and cause intestinal upset.

# **New Year's Resolutions**

Many people make New Year's resolutions on the first day of each New Year, when one pledges to either <u>start</u> doing something good or <u>stop</u> doing something bad during the coming year.

At the end of the Great Depression, about 25% of American adults made New Year's resolutions. Now, about 41% admit they do, while 42% claim they do not.

The resolution making idea originally came from religious backgrounds. In ancient Babylonia, the people made promises to their gods at the start of each year that they would return borrowed objects and pay their debts. The Romans began each year by making various promises to the god Janus; and the medieval knights took a vow each year to reaffirm their commitment to chivalry.

During Judaism's New Year, Rosh Hashanah, through the High Holidays and culminating in Yom Kippur, one is to reflect upon one's wrongdoings over the year and both seek and offer forgiveness. Similarly, during the Christian fasting period of Lent, some may act similarly, though the motive behind this holiday is more of sacrifice than of responsibility. In fact the practice of New Year's resolutions partially came from Lenten sacrifices.

Regardless of creed, the concept is to annually reflect upon self-improvement. Resolutions vary among individuals; these could include eating healthier meals, exercising more, drinking less alcohol, or losing weight.

Some other resolutions could include: making more time with family & friends, improving education or career, managing time more effectively, laughing more often or becoming more spiritual.

Whatever the resolutions are, statistics show that those who explicitly make a resolution and set up measurable goals are ten times more likely to achieve them, than those who only state a resolution.

THIS YEAR I will make a genuine and dedicated affort to a resolution.



# MARCH OF DIMES

by the March of Dimes. This non-profit organization was originally founded in 1938 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, as a response to America's epidemic of polio disease.

Comedian and entertainer, Eddie Cantor, "coined" the phrase "March of Dimes," noting that nearly everyone could send in one dime to support the cause, and ten dimes would be a dollar!

Later, on July 22, 1958 the March of Dimes, under the leadership of Basil O'Connor, announced a new mission: **Birth Defects Prevention**. With a continued focus on disabilities and disorders appearing in infancy and childhood.

This new strategy was different from fighting polio as the task was to funding genetics research and establish birth defects centers in hospitals.



With over eighty years of service, the organization is building on that legacy to support mothers and babies by educating medical

professionals and the public about best practices through lifesaving research and newborn screening for every family.

The March of Dimes studies into cellular and molecular basics of genetics and the developmental process of abnormalities, has improved medical diagnosis and treatment.

Through the past years, this research has led to improved prenatal diagnosis of sickle cell anemia and the development of surfactant therapy to treat respiratory distress syndrome.

The March of Dimes organization constantly is working to have every baby receive the best possible start.

Here are a few interesting January items...

- 1778: James Cook 'discovered' Hawaii, naming it the Sandwich Islands.

- 1908: The first New Year's ball drop in Times Square, New York.
- 1938: March of Dimes was established.

# Martin Luther King, Jr. Day



This day is a U.S. federal holiday recognizing the birthday of Rev. Dr.

Martin Luther King, Jr. It is always observed on the third Monday In January —

falling in 2024 on January 15th.

Born in Atlanta, Dr. King was an American Baptist minister, as well as a prominent leader in the African American civil rights movement. He is well known for his advancement of civil rights, always advising on the use of nonviolent methods in keeping with the teachings of Mahatma Gandhi. Due to his work, in 1964 he became the youngest person to receive the Nobel Peace Prize.

Sadly, Dr. King was assassinated on April 4, 1968. He was posthumously awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1977 and the Congressional Gold Medal in 2004.

Although the campaign for a federal holiday in his honor began soon after his death, it was in 1983 when President Ronald Reagan signed this national holiday into law. By 1986 it was observed by many states as a holiday; but it was in the year 2000 when all 50 states observed it as an official legal holiday.

# WINTER PARKING INFORMATION

Due to the importance of the information listed below, we felt it necessary to repeat this message and insist the following parking rules be observed. The Northfield Hills Condominium Association has 646 units and it takes much time, and big money to keep our parking areas, sidewalks and streets free of snow. Your cooperation and extra effort during the winter months is essential and very much appreciated.

# **PARKING**

With parking at such a premium, we must remind everyone that if you have a garage you MUST park your vehicle in it. Curbside parking is also illegal as they are Fire Lanes.

If you have company, please remind them they cannot park in someone's reserved parking spot. Let everyone know that if there is a number on the parking spot then it belongs to someone and that they CANNOT park there. Thank you.

# WINTER PARKING

Vehicles must be moved out of the court parking spaces when the plows arrive in each area. The snowplow drivers will perform an initial clean-up and then return a second time to allow Co-owners extra time if necessary.

Exercise caution when plow trucks are present – the drivers' vision is limited.

Salt your porch and sidewalk before a light snow. Spreading salt will help prevent ice buildup and slippery conditions. Salt is effective only for temperatures above 20 degrees.

Co-owners should not leave dog leashes, children's toys, and newspapers on sidewalks and porches. These items can become buried beneath the snow and cause injury to workers or damage to the blowers.

Vehicles should not be parked in or around the traffic circles at the end of Breeze Hill Place and Buckingham Place as this may prevent the snowplows from turning efficiently and prevent moving snow from the street. Also, large emergency vehicles use these traffic circles and parked vehicles impede their movement, slowing their response time.


Co-owners must remove cars parked in the driveway of their condo. Snowplow drivers are instructed not to plow adjoining driveways if a vehicle is parked in one of them. This pertains to all driveways, however long or short.

The City of Troy prohibits sidewalks from being obstructed. Cars parked in short driveways, where they cross the sidewalk, prevents the staff from effectively clearing your sidewalks. If the snow blower cannot be driven straight down the sidewalk to your condo's walkway, your sidewalks will not be shoveled.

Snowplows will **not** return to plow parking spaces after the day we sweep through the courts.

Do not leave decorative items on your front porch which may be damaged and will slow the shoveling process.

# Northfield Hills Snow Removal Rules - Including Fine Schedule

Vehicles <u>MUST</u> be moved out of the court parking spaces when the plows arrive in each area. The snowplow drivers will perform an initial clean-up and then return a second time to allow co-owners extra time if necessary. Vehicles that have not moved after the second sweep will result in a <u>fine being levied</u>. Fine are fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the first fine, seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) for the second fine and five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for the third and each subsequent fine. Buckingham, Breeze Hill and Brentwood are always plowed first so you can park your car there and move it back after the plows have left. FOR ANYONE WHO HAS QUESTIONS ON PARKING YOU CAN CALL THE CLUBHOUSE AND ASK FOR SEAN, 248-641-9070.

Exercise caution when plow trucks are present – the drivers' vision is limited.

**Salt your porch and sidewalk before a light snow**. Spreading salt will help prevent ice buildup and slippery conditions. Salt is effective only for temperatures above 20 degrees.

The City of Troy prohibits sidewalks from being obstructed. Cars parked in short driveways, where they cross the sidewalk, prevents the staff from effectively clearing your sidewalk. If the snow blower cannot be driven straight down the sidewalk to your condo's walkway, your sidewalks will not be shoveled. Snowplows will **not** return to plow parking spaces after the day we sweep through the courts.

These rules were approved by the Board of Directors December 15, 2002.

# Yummy Party Quiches



1 pkg. refrigerated pie crust at room temperature. 2 eggs

2/3 Cup milk
Dash ground black pepper
2/3 Cup finely shredded Monterey Jack or
Gruyere cheese
2 Tbsp chopped green onion
6 to 8 pear or cherry tomatoes, thinly
sliced, and /or 12 small herb leaves
Fresh thyme leaves (optional)

Preheat oven to 425°. Coat 12 muffin cups with cooking spray, set aside.

Divide pastry into 12 portions. Press each portion in a muffin cup. Do not prick. Bake for 8-10 minutes or just until pastry begins to brown. Remove from oven; set aside. Reduce oven to 350.

For quiche filling, in a small bowl whisk together egg, milk, and pepper. Stir in cheese and onion. Fill each pastry cup about 1/2 with filling. Top each quiche with a tomato slice or herb leaves.

Bake quiches for 20 minutes or until filling is puffed and set. Cool in muffin cups on a wire rack for 5 minutes. Remove from muffin cups. Serve warm. Makes 12 servings.


